## It started with three little girls and a family who had just arrived in the States from England!

When our daughters were very small (ages 3, 5 & 7) Daddy spent all of his time preaching in the prisons of Alabama. Wednesday night church, for us, was at 5pm in Staten Prison. The girls knew the ropes. They would enter through the big gates and go through the usual screenings before they were allowed in. "Nothing in your pockets?", the big, burly guard would ask gruffly, and they would pull out the lining of their little jackets to show they had no contraband. Then they would file quietly into the big disinfected Chapel, past the swaying rows of convicts who were dressed in prison whites and singing 'Victory in Jesus'. For the kids it was just Wednesday night church....No biggie.

They were unaware of the inmates who were assigned to keep an eye on their safety and monitor who could or couldn't sit near to them. They were unaware of the guys who glanced wistfully at them, wiping away a tear as they remembered their own kids that they never got to see. They were unaware that many of those men had not seen a small child for many, many years.

They just knew they had to stay right beside Mommy and sing their very best, because lots of those men didn't know Jesus, and might hear about Him for the first time tonight.

In the years following, the four little Spackman girls learned to share their home with lots of children whose Mommies were in prison. Many miracles of provision enabled their family to build a house on eighteen acres of donated land. Further divine intervention enabled the ministry to become established as a legal entity. Soon after they were able to build a beautiful school as well as additional homes and a nursery for babies who were born to mothers in prison.

Today the ministry continues to receive no government funding, relying solely on the generosity of God's people to meet the needs each month. Our awesome God, who still cares about the widows and orphans, had begun a work that would expand far beyond the Spackmans' wildest

The four Spackman girls and their spouses have worked with the ministry since they graduated and married. Out of this work has grown the ministry to an orphanage in Kenya, where, as shown on the front cover, we are about to build another school. In addition Adullam International Ministries has been entrusted with a Missionary Training Center in Scotland. The Training Center is in need of renovation in the Student Life Center, and God willing will be the means of equipping many of the children graduating from our schools in the USA, Kenya, and Europe, where AIM is still ministering to "the least of these"!
